TRAVEL COMMITTEE's PROPOSED CLEs (2023)

Focus: Travel and Human Trafficking

Members of the Travel CLE Committee have concurred with presenting CLEs abroad, as in past years, and are committed to presenting an hour CLE at this year's Bench Bar Conference.

The topic this year will be focused on the ugly side of travel, that being its ease of human trafficking. According to the U.S. Department of State, there are an estimated 24.9 million victims of human trafficking worldwide at any given time.

Overview of the CLEs will be the connection between travel and the victimization that results from human trafficking, and the legal needs of the victims. There will also be a component related to awareness/recognition, criminal justice, legislation and prevention.

Summary of Legal Needs:

Civil Law—

Trafficking victims have a wide range of civil legal needs, depending on their personal circumstances and the trafficking situation they endured. Some will need only limited legal services for a short period of time, while others will have multiple legal issues that may last for many years.

Legal services partners might include domestic violence agencies that provide legal representation, general legal aid agencies, law school clinical programs, specialized legal service organizations, such as those that focus on specific legal issues (immigration, employment, or family law) or specific populations (children, lesbian, gay, bisexual, transgender, LGBTQ populations, or people with disabilities), and public defenders or other criminal defense providers.

Legal issues commonly presented by trafficking victims include immigration or repatriation, family law, and public benefits access.

Civil litigation can include trafficking survivors filing civil lawsuits against their traffickers or those involved in the trafficking operation. This may include charges of human trafficking, violations of labor and employment laws, violations of contracts, and other violations of civil law. These actions may help survivors obtain greater damages, and when criminal charges cannot be filed, pursuing a case as the plaintiff in a civil suit can help survivors reverse their victim status and feel in charge of their lives once again.

Family Law—

Victims might need a Protection or Restraining Order to order the trafficker to stay away from the victim and/or to return the victim's possessions. These orders may be included in any criminal proceeding, but victims may need to seek a civil order while the case is pending or when there is no criminal case. Victims, particularly those who are related to their traffickers, may need assistance with separation, divorce, child custody and support, guardianship, or adoption. Even the strongest families can be irreparably damaged by the trafficking experience and may need legal resolution.

Employment Law—

Trafficking victims may also have been subject to violations under the Fair Labor Standards Act, which requires the payment of minimum wage and overtime to covered, non-exempt workers. Trafficking victims may also have claims under state or local minimum wage laws or contract law. Victims may have been subjected to harassment or discrimination in their workplace and need assistance in filing a complaint with the Equal Employment Opportunity Commission. The Department of Labor investigates workplaces for violations of the Fair Labor Standards Act and may encounter potential trafficking victims during the course of an investigation, at which time it would refer the case to an appropriate law enforcement agency.

The DOL is sometimes asked by law enforcement agencies to assist in calculating restitution owed to victims.

There are many local and state employment laws that may be stronger than federal labor laws, so lawyers should consider helping trafficking survivors file and pursue civil suits that involve accommodation issues, sexual harassment and discrimination, wage and hour violations, workers' compensation, disability rights, and immigration issues.

Public Benefits Access—

Trafficking survivors may be eligible for a wide range of federally and locally funded public benefits, but usually need assistance to access these benefits. The services available to them may depend on their income, legal status, marital status, age, criminal record, and other factors. Public benefits offices may not be familiar with human trafficking and may not apply the appropriate criteria for assessing eligibility. Sometimes receiving monetary awards from a successfully settled civil suit or criminal restitution case can make survivors ineligible for public benefits. Trafficking survivors should receive help from benefits attorneys to structure their money damages properly.

1. TRAVEL and HUMAN TRAFFICKING: Since

the pandemic the entire world is beginning to experience a tourism boom all over again. Although travel hasn't yet reached pre-pandemic levels, the negative effects of the industry are becoming more apparent once again. With international and domestic travel becoming easier, cheaper, and more accessible each year, and with the rising popularity of international travel and tourism, the negative effects of environmental degradation, commodification of culture, and human trafficking are back with a vengeance. Unfortunately, one particularly heinous side of the travel industry is the connection between human trafficking and tourism.

Several factors make the tourism industry especially vulnerable to human trafficking and modern slavery. The relative anonymity provided by the frequent changeover of guests allows for trafficking victims to slip by unnoticed in hotels and airports. This is especially true of sex traffickers, who may be using hotels and motels as part of their operation. The commonplace use of subcontractors for construction workers, security guards, wait staff, and cleaning or maintenance staff creates increased vulnerability for labor trafficking within the tourism industry itself. 2. IMMIGRATION ISSUES IN HUMAN

TRAFFICKING: Attorneys, along with global leaders and the travel industry need to join efforts to combat and prevent human trafficking.

Counter-Trafficking experts are needed in all fields to stop trafficking, and provide an aid to the victims, of which many are immigrants without resources. An overview of the T-visa case process and how attorneys can represent these individuals will be provided.

This one hour CLE will provide education and insight to attorneys who wish to represent and support survivors, protect their rights, and advocate for changes that provide protection.

Human trafficking is the reprehensible practice of physically or psychologically compelling an individual to work or provide commercial sexual services. An estimated 21-30 million people are currently enslaved worldwide, and sadly, fewer than one percent of these individuals are identified. Attorneys have the much-needed skills, clientele, and positions to help shrink this alarming gap, by integrating identification, services, and prevention strategies into their respective practices. Prosecutors are pursuing criminal offenses for those involved, but civil side practitioners can play an effective role and provide legal representation above and beyond what the criminal justice system can provide for individual victims.

This CLE will address the legal needs of Human Trafficking Survivors, along with immigration relief for these survivors; plus tips for Attorneys working with Human Trafficking Survivors.

3. <u>THE CRIMINAL SIDE OF HUMAN</u>

TRAFFICKING: This CLE will provide an overview of how lawyers advocating for victims by getting criminal convictions of the perpetrators can empower trafficked women, men, and children to seek justice. Lawyers working within the criminal justice system are the back bone in efforts to hold human traffickers accountable for their crimes and to raise awareness of victims' rights. By linking trafficking victims with skilled attorneys in an effort to obtain criminal convictions, criminal restitution, and civil judgments against traffickers, trafficking survivors can rebuild their lives.

Discussion will include the recent history of this topic to include that in 2003, Washington became the first state to criminalize human trafficking. Since then, every state has enacted laws establishing criminal penalties for traffickers seeking to profit from forced labor or sexual servitude. The laws vary in several ways including who is defined as a "trafficker," the statutory elements required to prove guilt in order to obtain a conviction and the seriousness of the criminal and financial penalties those convicted will face.

In order to obtain a trafficking conviction, state laws, in most instances, require that prosecutors prove traffickers compelled their victims into labor or sexual servitude. The majority of laws include the elements force, fraud and coercion, but their definition can vary greatly from state to state. For example, in some states, their definition focuses primarily on the use of physical force. Other states more broadly include psychological control, financial threats, legal harassment and drug addiction. In addition, some states have enacted measures that specifically address penalties that apply to a business entity if it has committed, or has been used in committing, a human trafficking crime. Laws also create procedures for the dissolution of the business entity, as well as, establish additional fines.

This CLE will also discuss affirmative defense for victims. The majority of states enable trafficked victims to assert an affirmative defense to criminal charges they face as a result of actions they were forced to commit by their traffickers. An affirmative defense is evidence that, if found credible, negates criminal liability even if it is proved the defendant committed the acts at issue. Statutes differ in the crimes for which an affirmative defense can be raised, but many cover prostitution, loitering and solicitation. Thirty-one (31) states provide affirmative defense for trafficking survivors, including Pennsylvania.

This one-hour CLE will focus mainly on the criminal law aspects of this topic.

CLE #4 Date: October 23, 2023 Location: Isabel Island, Galapagos

4. GOVERNMENT and LEGISLATION: This one -

hour CLE will explore what is happening at the legislative level to combat human trafficking. In 2000, Congress signed the Victims of Trafficking and Violence Protection Act into law, representing the beginning of a large-scale, coordinated effort by the United States government to fight human trafficking. Unfortunately, human trafficking remains prevalent, worsened by the ease of travel and transportation.

The need to combat this problem continues, and on March 3, 2022, 3 members of the House introduced a bill, referred to as the "No Travel for Traffickers Act of 2022"; which was referred to the Committee on the Judiciary, and in addition to the Committee on Foreign Affairs.

This bill bars from the visa waiver program any country that allows individuals to obtain citizenship by making an investment in that country.

Overview of this bill:

SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.

This Act may be cited as the "No Travel for Traffickers Act of 2022".

SEC. 2. LIMITATION ON PARTICIPATION IN THE VISA WAIVER PROGRAM.

Section 217 of the Immigration and Nationality Act (8 U.S.C. 1187) is amended—

(1) in subsection (c)(2), by adding at the end the following:

"(H) NOT A DISQUALIFIED COUNTRY.—The country is not a country disqualified from designation under subsection (j)."; and

(2) by adding at the end the following:

"(j) Disqualified Countries.—A country shall be ineligible for designation under subsection (c) as a program country if the country has in effect any program permitting an individual who is not a national of that country to be provided with citizenship, on condition that the individual make an investment in that country."

SEC. 3. LIST OF FOREIGN STATES WITH CITIZENSHIP BY INVESTMENT PROGRAMS.

No later than 60 days after the enactment of this Act, the Secretary of Homeland Security shall provide to the appropriate congressional committees an unclassified list of countries ineligible for designation as program countries under section 217(j) of the Immigration and Nationality Act.

SEC. 4. COOPERATION WITH EUROPEAN UNION AND UNITED KINGDOM.

The Secretary of Homeland Security shall engage with partners in the European Union, the United Kingdom, and other relevant partners to eliminate Schengen area visa-free travel access for foreign states that are ineligible for designation as program countries under section 217(j) of the Immigration and Nationality Act.

SEC. 5. RESTRICTION ON USE OF FUNDS FOR FOREIGN VETTING.

No amounts made available in appropriations Acts may be used for the purpose of vetting applicants for a program described in section 217(j) of the Immigration and Nationality Act on behalf of, or at the request of, a foreign state, or to otherwise assist a foreign state with the operation of such a program.

The presenter will discuss this bill, and other governmental areas that strive to prevent human trafficking and punish those that perpetrate it, to include the four executive agencies of the U.S. government, along with state and local law enforcement organizations, which work together as well as with nonprofit organizations to combat human trafficking.



Effective May 2, 2023, a Divorce Decree or Annulment of Marriage *must* include a provision regarding the beneficiary status on an existing life insurance policy, annuity, pension, profit-sharing plan or other contractual arrangement. Title 23 Pa. C.S.A. Section 3323(b.1) titled Existing Beneficiary Designations addresses the required provision to be included in the Divorce Decree. Pennsylvania Rule of Civil Procedure 1920.76 Form of Divorce Decree reflects how the provision for the beneficiaries should be referenced in the Divorce Decree.


